

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Introduction

The 'parish plan' is a government initiative aimed at reflecting the views of a community about the place they live in, to help shape plans and developments in areas such as health, crime and safety, education, residential development, the environment and so on.

The two previous plans, 'A Village Appraisal 2003' and 'Broadmayne looks Forward 2006' have been valuable in achieving a number of beneficial results for the community . Such projects as involving the Dorchester Area Community Partnership in pursuing the provision of a cycleway to Dorchester, pressing for improved broadband internet service and creating a "Patient Support Group" transport scheme, are just an example of successful action points.

In 2014 the Broadmayne Parish Plan group was formed at the request of Broadmayne Parish Council. Made up of local residents the purpose of the group was to create and distribute a questionnaire to obtain the views of the local community and then collate and analyse the feedback to produce a report and action plan outlining the wishes and requirements of the village.

A Parish Plan is supported by statistical evidence from the community, and therefore provides a clear and representative view of what the community feels is important and relevant to them. The report and action plan is distributed to key service providers such as the County Council, District Council, Primary Care Trust, Parish Council and Local Constabulary to work together to put these actions into place.

Broadmayne's Parish Plan questionnaire was distributed to 549 residences in November 2014 and a total of 371 responses were received, equating to a 68% return, which is an excellent result for an initiative of this kind and the results can therefore be accepted as identifying the main concerns and interests of the village and the surrounding area.

The questionnaire and plan consists of twelve sections:

- 1. You and your household, 2. Road Safety, 3. Transport,
- 4. Footpaths and Bridleways, 5. Cycleways, 6. Health and Wellbeing,
- 7. Senior Citizens, 8. Young People, 9. Housing, 10. Natural Environment,
- 11. Leisure, Social and Cultural Facilities, 12. General

Community Assets

Broadmayne is very fortunate to have a variety of assets which its residents value greatly. Their support for several of them has been demonstrated recently.

The Village Hall. The hall is very well used for varied activities benefiting many Broadmayne residents. Following various surveys and questionnaires the Parish Council has a plan and planning permission for a revitalisation and extension of the hall aimed at general improvement but specifically a new enlarged and better positioned kitchen, increased storage, a brighter entrance and new toilets. This will make the hall more attractive to hirers and aid its sustainability. The Parish Council and the hall committee have made considerable funds available but further fund raising will be required and support from residents vital.

The Playing Field. The field now benefits from fitness equipment purchased by the Parish Council in response to a village survey. The council is also refurbishing and improving the ageing changing room block which will be of benefit to the football teams and others who use the playing field. The project will also make the facility more attractive to new hirers.

Also on the playing field site is the well-equipped and popular children's play area, the tennis court and a basketball hoop with hard shooting circle.

The Corner House Stores. A recent survey (March 2015) showed how valued the shop and Post Office is; with 56% of those who responded finding the shop "vital" whilst 85% reported using it at least weekly. Following a packed meeting of well over 100 villagers who put great value on the shop and the pub, both were listed as Assets of Community Value in January 2014. This gives a community group the right to consider bidding for them if they ever came onto the market. Another meeting of over 100 villagers (June 2015) gave wholehearted support to the idea of a community bid to run the shop as a community shop.

The Black Dog. At the meeting mentioned above villagers were very vocal in their support for a village pub and were very pleased when it was bought and refurbished by a local business man who continues to run it as a pub.

The Doctor's Surgery and Dispensary. Broadmayne is also very fortunate to benefit from a medical practice in the village. This valued asset is also supporting residents of neighbouring villages and like all the others would be greatly missed if it were to close.

Broadmayne First School. Young families in Broadmayne are able to take advantage of a thriving and highly regarded school in the village taking children from a reception class till they move on to one of the successful middle schools in the area.

The Garage. Providing car sales, servicing and maintenance.

With regard to these and other Broadmayne assets the principle of **USE IT OR LOSE IT** clearly applies.

The following is a summary of the results from the 2014 questionnaire. An Action Plan is included providing a brief description of the intended follow-up:

Q1 You and Your Household

Q1.a & b.

On average, residents have lived in Broadmayne for 19 years, the longest being 86 years.

Broadmayne age profiles compared to the National and West Dorset average (Source www.DorsetForYou.com website), shows figures below average in the younger and middle age groups. Therefore Broadmayne has a higher older population than in most other areas.

Q1.c. With regard to employment, those who are economically active may be employed, self-employed or actively seeking employment. In Broadmayne these figures are below the National Average. This fact being attributed to the higher number of residents of retirement age.

- 1. Retired (29.5%)
- 2. Full time employed (26.8%)
- 3. Unemployed (13.5%)
- 4. Part time employed (12.4%)
- 5. Full time education (11.6%)

Q1.d. Respondents most liked:

- 1. The rural/country atmosphere of the village
- 2. Friendliness of community
- 3. Proximity of Broadmayne to Dorchester
- 4. Facilities and amenities, The Shop/Post Office, School and Black Dog Inn scoring the highest figures.

Q1.e. Dislikes:

- 1. Busy main road/speeding traffic
- 2. Poor public transport
- 3. Lack of 'village centre'
- 4. Lack of footways and parking facilities

Throughout the questionnaire one major topic continued to arise. That is road safety. Speeding vehicles, the quantity of heavy vehicles, and vehicles not stopping at the pedestrian crossing, accounting for some 62 % of respondents dislikes.

Q2 Road Safety

Q2.1. Road safety in the village is of major concern to villagers, some 64% of respondents considered that it was unsafe for pedestrians and just 58% of drivers feeling safe. The problems are multiple including poor road junctions, lack of footways, roadside parking, speeding and the much increased volume of very large vehicles on the main road through the village. Most of these issues having been raised many times have already been investigated by the highway authority but no practical solutions have been found to be possible.

Considering these in turn:

- **Q2.2.** The visibility at some road junctions is poor including particularly the Rectory Road junction with Main Street, the Rectory Road Junction with Chalky Road, the junction of Chalky Road with Main Street and the Bramble Drove junction with Main Street. Given the surrounding properties at these junctions it is not easy to propose improvements.
- **Q2.3.** The lack of footways particularly on Main Street is serious for example between Rectory Road and the Church, and 'The Black Dog' and beyond. Pedestrians are at risk in these areas, particularly if very large vehicles happen to be passing.
- **Q2.4.** Over the past few years both the frequency and the size of lorries and farm vehicles has very markedly increased. The reason for this is not entirely clear

given the bypasses around Wimborne, Puddletown and Dorchester, and the Weymouth relief road which might have been expected to ease the passage of commercial traffic coming from the Poole/Bournemouth area and further east. Previous recordings of traffic flows, taken by the highway authority, should be reexamined and ways sought to encourage the use of these 'bypass routes'

- **Q2.5.** The re-classification of the road (A352) as a B road is also for consideration given the lack of footways, the narrowness of the road, and the issues with very large vehicles using the road.
- **Q2.6.** Many respondents were concerned about speeding through the village. Suggestions included, improved warning signposts on the approaches to the village as well as a permanent flashing indicator for those exceeding the limit. They also suggested a speed camera should be considered. The speed limit too should be reviewed—perhaps dropping the limit to 20mph.

Q3 Transport

- **Q3.1.** The vast majority of respondents have access to a vehicle for daytime use. However around 15% of respondents use the bus service 2/3 times a week; only 5% daily. The bus service runs daily in working hours except Sundays.
- **Q3.2.** Some respondents wished for an extended evening service; some voiced concern about the reliability of the timetables. It is for consideration as to whether DCC might do more to promote the service locally.

There were also a number of comments concerning the rather unfriendly attitude of some drivers.

Q4 Footpaths and Bridleways

Q4.a. Footpaths and bridleways can provide an important and healthy recreational facility for walkers, and also be of use in aiding road safety by separating motor traffic from pedestrians and horse riders. In Broadmayne, 93% of respondents use the footpaths and bridleways at sometime during the year.

Over 4 out of ten respondents use the rights of way on a daily basis, with a further 3 out of ten using them weekly.

These results show a need to maintain a much used and beneficial communal asset.

There were requests for: (a) better marking of pathways, (b) additional and/or improved maps of these public rights of way to be provided.

Q5 Cycleways

Q5.a. 72% of respondents would like to see other cycleways introduced. Nearly half of respondents would like to see a cycleway to Weymouth/Preston.

Four out of ten would like to see a track to West Knighton. This route should form part of the proposed Dorchester track.

Q6 Health and Wellbeing

Q6.a. Additional services: Broadmayne is very fortunate to benefit from a medical practice in the village. But, considering the size of the community, people are concerned that certain facilities are not readily available. Physiotherapy, Mobile Health Screening and Dentistry are the top 3 additional services respondents say they would use, if available in the village.

Q6.b. Patient Support Group: Just under half of respondents were aware of the patient support group run by volunteers in Broadmayne. As with a number of other useful services available within the area, the existence of this valuable service was in need of wider publicity.

Q6.c. Antenatal /toddlers: For the most part, facilities, clubs/groups seemed to be catering well. But there were suggestions that that maybe a few more or longer duration meetings could take place.

Q7 Senior Citizens

Q7.a. 53% of respondents would support the production of a Personal Emergency Information Card. These cards can supply useful information in times of medical need.

Q7.b 45% of respondents would favour a summertime monthly walking group.

Q7.c. Low cost transport for health visits is by far the most requested service. Also, more home visits and social clubs or activities form the main thrust of respondents needs.

Q8 Young People

Youngsters regarded Broadmayne as a good village to grow up in. (90%). This pleasing result is a tribute to the parents, schools, and club/activity leaders and general population of Broadmayne.

Over 4 out of 10 did not take part in an organised activity. When asked which activities would they like to see organised in Broadmayne, the responses fell into 3 main categories:

- 1. A youth club & youth club related activities. (50%)
- 2. More organised sporting activities. (32%)
- 3. Summertime activities. (36%)

Q9 Housing

Q9.1. Recent planning applications have illustrated villagers' concerns over large scale developments where the existing roads and road junctions are regarded as unable to safely support increased traffic usage. The survey revealed no strong demand for significantly more housing. There would be support for small scale developments if traffic problems and road junction issues could be catered for.

Q9.2. Were there to be small-scale development the strongest view was that it should be small family homes and homes for the young including, where feasible, low cost/shared ownership homes.

Q10 Natural Environment

Broadmayne is fortunate in being a generally quiet and environmentally aware village. Perhaps its greatest shortcoming is the problem arising from traffic in its various manifestations and vehicle parking which undoubtedly undermine the environment. These problems and an action plan are dealt with elsewhere (Section 2).

Turning to the Natural Environment there was strong support for several suggested improvements and developments:

- **Q10.1.** Preservation of selected verges. This was mentioned by many including the protection of flora and fauna through the cultivation and timely selection of selected verges in consultation with The Dorset wildlife Trust. (58%)
- **Q10.2.** Creation of a natural wildlife area somewhere within the village was supported by 56% of respondents. For example, the feasibility and effectiveness of cordoning off a field margin, possibly near the playing field, should be explored, (agriculturally defined as an arable field margin).
- **Q10.3.** There was also strong support for the creation of a circular nature trail around the village. (48%). The trail would need to be well signposted and should include brief descriptions of points of interest, both natural and historic, around the trail.
- **Q10.4.** Also supported was that strategically placed maps should be located around the village showing paths and nature walks. (65%)

Q11 Leisure, Social and Cultural Facilities

Q11.a. A number of local amenities were regularly used/visited. The most popular were:

- 1. Village Hall/Playing Field/Children's Play Area
- 2. Corner House Stores
- Post Office
- 4. Post Boxes
- 5. Local footpaths and bridleways
- 6. Notice boards
- 7. Black Dog pub

Q11.b. Various activities were suggested, some of which already exist in the village, from more art lessons, to Zumba classes. But, no overall leaders in either sporting or social activities emerged. As a general theme, more craft, fitness and youth clubs found the most favour.

Q12 General

Q12.a. News about what is going on in the Parish is conveyed in a number of diverse ways:

Both Notice boards and Word-of-Mouth are favoured by virtually all respondents (98%), followed by the Compass Magazine, (82%) and the Parish Website, (50%).

Q12.b. Improvements or more frequent updates to the Parish Community website were suggested as a good way to improve communications in the Parish. Specific suggestions included an on-line newsletter and Parish Council Agenda (*This is available on the Community website*). Likewise, a printed newsletter was favoured by some.

Q12.c. By far the largest proportion of responses to "What changes or improvements would you like to see take place?" concerned road safety. The top request was for more roadside paths, especially toward Conygar, followed by traffic calming measures, street lighting and a pelican crossing to replace the existing crossing.

Other improvements included less building development, more bins for dog waste, and improved road cleaning.

In Conclusion

The action plan will be driven, monitored and reported upon through the Parish Council on an ongoing basis. The topics covered by the plan, fall into two main categories, those that can be addressed by the Parish Council and the community and secondly, those that are within the remit of other authorities or organisations.

It must be remembered that there may be inhibiting factors in progressing certain topics within the action plan:

- The cost of projects
- The practicality of projects
- The need to involve outside organisations
- Recruiting of local volunteers

Nevertheless, all action points will be reviewed and acted and reported upon as appropriate. Anyone with a special interest in any of the projects is encouraged to contact either the Parish Clerk or any member of the Parish Council.

Questionnaire

What is this questionnaire for?

This questionnaire is being distributed to every household in the Parish. It is the first step towards revising earlier Parish Plans, and is your chance to have a say. It has been prepared for the Parish Council by a Parish Plan Steering Group which will collate, analyse and publish the answers.

Why should you fill it in?

It won't take long to complete but it is important that the new plan reflects the aspirations of all residents. It will be important because it will identify what is significant to people living in the parish, it will help to identify problems and areas that could be improved, and it will support local people when issues arise within the parish over the next 5years. The Parish Council, District Council and County Council will have the Parish Plan as a prompt for future action.

Can it actually affect anything?

Yes it can. For example, in response to previous questionnaires and plans, the Parish Council has installed fitness equipment on the playing field and its plans to re-furbish the changing room block and to improve and extend the village hall are well advanced. Also the Council is pursuing, with partners, the installation of a cycle route to Dorchester. All these improvements were requested by parishioners. Of course, not all your suggestions will be affordable or achievable and many will depend on volunteers coming forward but they will all be investigated.

What next?
